

Need for Dog Park

Facility Needs and Priorities

The types of parks/facilities with the highest number of households with an unmet need were:

- 1. Sledding hills 2,941 households
- 2. Nature centers and trails 2,319 households
- 3. Off-leash dog parks 2,143 households
- 4. Walking and biking trails 1,907 households
- 5. Outdoor tennis/Pickelball courts 1,810 households



Priority Investment Rating

Based the priority investment rating (PIR), the following four facilities were rated as "high priorities" for investment:

- Walking and biking trails (PIR=165)
- Nature centers and trails (PIR=130)
- Sledding hills (PIR=118)
- Off-leash dog parks (PIR=103)

Dog Park Features

Typical Dog Park Features

- Space (minimum one acre)
- Separate areas for small/large dogs
- Four-to-six foot fencing
- Double-gate entry system
- Hydration station (for dogs and owners)
- Water station to hose off dogs
- Waste station (waste bags, trash can, scoopers)

- Appropriate ground cover
- Shaded Area (for dogs and owners)
- Benches/tables (for owners)
- Fun features (agility, exercise, tunnels, play area)
- Signage (instructions, warnings, sponsors)
- Water features (splash pad, fountain, lake)


Recommendation

Proposed Site: Colony Park Field Area

- Up to 2.65 acres of land
- Rarely used for organized activities (four-five reservations per year)
- Walking distance of neighborhoods, including access from pedestrian bridge for neighborhoods north of the railroad tracks
- Not as active as other parks (39% according to study)
- Access to water supply
- Ample parking
- Restrooms on site







Next Steps

- Discuss at Park Board meeting
- Make proposal to City Council
- Invite community feedback (Park Board Meeting, FOHP, etc.)
- Engage staff and/or dog park designer for ideas on use of space
- Determine potential budget
- Apply for grants
- Look for potential sponsors
- Solicit donations from groups, individuals, businesses, etc.
