

- In 1999, Park Board undertook a Master Planning process.
- The first step in this process was a survey of Hudson residents.
 - 79% of adults surveyed ranked multi-purpose trails as the most important need
 - 76% of adults surveyed ranked trails that link neighborhoods to parks as important
 - 68% of adults surveyed ranked trails that link the city together as important
- As a result, the Parks Master Plan prominently features the establishment of a citywide trail network
- Upon completion, this plan was approved by the Park Board and City Council in 2000.


Connectivity Plan as shown in the Parks Master Plan




- Park Board and Park staff have always listed this project as its highest priority.
- For years, attempted to begin Veterans Trail south of downtown.
- Progress has been limited due to conflicting desires of current property owners.



Feasibility Study

 Partnered with Stow, Silver Lake, Cuyahoga Falls on feasibility study for trail south of downtown Hudson in 2005.

2009 Needs Assessment

- In 2009, Park Board undertook a Needs Assessment to determine resident priorities.
- The first step in this process was a survey of Hudson residents.
 - 88% of adults surveyed ranked nature trails as a high or medium priority.
 - 74% of adults surveyed ranked trails that connect neighborhoods to downtown as a high or medium priority.
 - 74% of adults surveyed ranked trails that connect parks as a high or medium priority.
 - 75% of adults surveyed ranked trails that connect to Cuyahoga Valley National Park or Metro Parks Serving Summit County as a high or medium priority.
- These findings reinforced the high value that Hudson residents place on trails and connectivity.




- In 2012, Park staff was approached by Village of Boston Heights who hoped to begin their section of trail.
 - They hoped to have the funds available in construct trail in conjunction with much needed road work.
 - They wanted to partner on a trail feasibility study and hoped that we would be interested in construction Hudson's portion of trail in increase regional impact.
- The Park Board decided to pursue this trail section first because Hines Hill was being repaved and we hoped to realize a cost savings if the project could be completed as the road work was completed.



Feasibility Study

 Partnered with Village of Boston Heights on feasibility study for trail north of downtown Hudson in 2012.

- Based on potential future costs, Park staff immediately began searching for alternative funding to leverage tax dollars.
 - Clean Ohio Trails Fund, administered by ODNR
 - AMATS funding
- Meeting with ODNR
 - A site visit revealed their desire to assist with funding.
 - They suggested the project by broken into \$1 million segments to increase chances for successful applications.
 - Grant applications showing significant community involvement would garner extra points.
 - Grant application was submitted on 2/1/13.
 - Grants will be awarded 8/1/13 for funding in FY2014.

Friends of Hudson Parks

- The Friends of Hudson Parks stepped forward and sought out community support of the project.
 - They received letters of support from 34 individuals and organizations.
 - Cuyahoga Valley National Park and Metro Parks Serving Summit County
 - Summit County Executive Russ Pry
 - State Representative Kristina Roegner
 - Ohio Senator Frank LaRose
 - Ohio & Erie Canalway Coalition and Western Reserve Land Conservancy
 - Safe Routes Hudson, Destination Hudson and Hudson Library and Historical Society
 - Merchants of Hudson, Hudson Area Chamber of Commerce, and Hudson Village Finance Company
 - Hudson Preschool Parents and Hudson Parent Teacher Organization
 - They received financial pledges from 6 individuals and organizations.
 - Burton Morgan Foundation
 - Summa Western Reserve Hospital
 - Friends of Hudson Parks



Potential Funding of Trail

- 2013 Phase 1- \$800,000 from Parks budget
- 2014 Phase 2- \$1,000,000
 - \$650,000 from ODNR
 - \$350,000 from Parks budget
- 2015 Phase 3- \$1,000,000
 - \$650,000 from ODNR
 - \$350,000 from Parks budget
- 2016 Phase 4- \$1,000,000
 - \$700,000 from AMATS
 - \$300,000 from Parks budget



Why build this trail?

- The residents of Hudson desire connectivity. This trail has often been referred to as the "Spine Trail" as it will serve as the main connection in the proposed trail system.
- There will be an economic impact to the downtown area as residents will have a direct connection to businesses and the Hudson Library.
- There will be a connection to the Bike and Hike Trail at both ends of town. These connections offer immediate connectivity to this 33-mile long trail.



Why build this section first?

- Moving forward on Phase 1 in 2013 will help the chances of grant funding in Phase 2.
- Residents will be able to access this trail immediately by using existing parking areas.
- In just two years, we can have a trail that extends from our border with the Village of Boston Heights to our historic downtown area.
