Mr. Jerry Lynch, co-owner of LifeCenter Plus Health & Fitness Center and resident of 2772 Ira Road, Akron, Ohio, spoke against passage of proposed Ordinance No. 15-58. He commented that information provided on Hudson's electric bill is not detailed enough for customers to discern how the proposed rate increase will affect their future bills. Additionally, he felt that the consultant's report did not give ample information explaining the need for a rate increase. He asked Council members to consider the effects of this rate increase and to pursue other solutions before taking action on this Ordinance.

Mr. John Hazenfield, 5457 Stow Road, spoke to Council, asking for their support of Resolution No. 15-64. He explained that he and his wife own a horse farm on this property, and they are in the process of selling it.

Mr. Greg Garwood, 5618 Humelsine Drive, said that he lives adjacent to the subject property, and he expressed concerns regarding the potential future property owner and possible issues concerning drainage, noise, and odors. He said that he did not have any problems with how the current property owners have operated the farm until now. Mayor

Currin urged Mr. Garwood to contact the Community Development Department for additional information.

Mr. John Hazenfield said that he has never had any complaints from neighbors in the years he has owned the farm. He said that the land is zoned as District 1, and that he could sell it for a potential housing development but prefers to sell it as a horse farm.

Ms. Howington said that the draft Comprehensive Plan Report will be available soon, the City will have an open house in early June to receive public input and answer questions, and City Council will discuss the matter during a July workshop before it is sent to the Planning Commission for review and recommendation. Executive Summary: The Hudson Public Power Division has been consistently striving towards achieving the APPA RP3 designation. Over the past four years, HPP staff has been working diligently to meet requirements in best management practices, safety management training and implementation, as well as electric system maintenance and reliability improvements.

In April 2015, the Hudson Public Power Division received the APPA RP3 Gold membership. The following employees were instrumental in HPP receiving this significant award: Kevin Powell, Public Works Superintendent for Utilities; Russ Brunstetter, Assistant Superintendent; Dave Autz, Systems Supervisor; and Dave Griffith, Systems Supervisor.

Mr. Powell and Mr. Griffith accepted this award on behalf of all the hard-working employees at Hudson Public Power. Ms. Howington noted that out of 2,000 public power entities, Hudson Public Power is one of only 184 that have achieved this level of success. Mr. Hanink applauded Hudson Public Power employees for their hard work and diligent efforts in keeping the lights on, and Mayor Currin congratulated and thanked them on behalf of the Hudson community.
