Proclamation

Mayor Basil observed that the Constitution is a remarkable document, which has served this nation for over 200 years, and it remains the greatest experiment in human freedom, liberty and self-governance that the world has ever known. Members of the David Hudson Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution accepted the Proclamation, and Jane Plank, Regent, thanked Mayor Basil and Council Members for this recognition.

7. Public Comments

Mr. Frank Youngwerth, 5 Laurel Lake Drive, spoke on behalf of the Merino and Wimer families and extended sincere thanks to elected officials for the recognition of Rich Merino. He said that they look forward to being in attendance at the honorary street sign unveiling ceremony for Merino Way.

8. Correspondence and Council Comments

Mr. Hanink reported that he recently noticed cyanobacteria algae on Hudson Springs Lake, and he asked that the City look into a solution.

Mr. Kelemen announced the Green on the Green event, scheduled on Saturday, September 17, 2016, on the Gazebo Green, and he encouraged citizens to attend.

9. Report of Manager

Ms. Howington said that Labor Day was different this year, with Taste of Hudson on hiatus. She noted that event planners are refocusing on Hudson eateries for next year's event, which promises to be better than ever.

She also commented that opioid addiction is an unfortunate reality, and officials are working to increase awareness of overdoses in Summit County in an effort to stem this alarming trend. Mayor agreed, commenting that Hudson has addressed this issue openly in cooperation with the Schools, and these efforts will continue with the additional aid of Community First.

10. Appointments

Mr. DeSaussure announced that City Council is accepting applications through September 30, 2016, for positions on the Cemetery Board, Environmental Awareness Committee, Board of Zoning & Building Appeals, and the Planning Commission. Executive Summary: The ordinance amends provisions concerning traffic impact studies and fire access, and repeals standards better located in the Engineering Standards.

Ordinance No. 16-114

Mayor Basil read the title of Ordinance No. 16-114, which constituted its third reading.

Mr. Hanink inquired of how the Engineering Standards are created and amended. Ms. Howington explained that the Engineering Standards are submitted by the Engineering Department, designed according to AASHTO (American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials) regulations, which are generally accepted engineering standards; staff makes a recommendation to Council, and Council adopts them by Ordinance. She said that staff has recommended moving the Engineering Standards from the Land Development Code (Ord. No. 16-144) to Chapter 1419, Engineering Standards for Infrastructure Construction (Ord. No. 16-131). Mrs. Lane said that City Council would need to approve any amendments to the Engineering Standards, similar to Building Code Amendments. Mr. Hanink noted that the figures for Section 7 specify that the Land Development Code be adhered to pertaining to sidewalks.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE ENGINEERING STANDARDS FOR INFRASTRUCTURE CONSTRUCTION AND DIRECTING THEIR CODIFICATION INTO CHAPTER 1419, "ENGINEERING STANDARDS FOR INFRASTRUCTURE CONSTRUCTION," OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES.

Executive Summary: In an effort to streamline publication of the Codified Ordinances, City staff has recommended that the Engineering Standards for Infrastructure Construction be included in Chapter 1419, "Engineering Standards for Infrastructure Construction" of the Codified Ordinances. Additionally, Section 7 of the City of Hudson Engineering Standards for Infrastructure Construction was last updated in 2015, and staff would like to update this section to reflect various changes and the transfer of information from the Hudson Land Development Code to the Engineering Standards.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A MORATORIUM ON APPLICATIONS FOR, AND THE GRANTING OF, ZONING CERTIFICATES FOR ANY BUILDING, STRUCTURE, USE OR CHANGE OF USE THAT WOULD ENABLE THE CULTIVATION, PROCESSING, DISTRIBUTION OR SALE OF MEDICAL MARIJUANA FOR A PERIOD NOT TO EXCEED SIX MONTHS IN ORDER TO ALLOW THE CITY TO REVIEW APPLICABLE STATE AND LOCAL LAWS, TO PLAN FOR REGULATIONS RELATING TO SUCH USES; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Executive Summary: The resolution would prevent the City from accepting applications for, and issuing, zoning certificates for activities related to medical marijuana for six months in order to perform proper planning related to such uses.

Mayor Basil read the title of Ordinance No. 16-146, which constituted its first reading.

Dr. Williams stated that a moratorium will allow for State regulations to be adopted, for the City to review and adopt local guidelines, and to prevent grandfathering. Mr. Kelemen supported Resolution No. 16-146, but he suggested a one-year moratorium. On behalf of the City Solicitor, Mrs. Lane recommended a six-month moratorium, which could be extended it if need be. Mr. DeSaussure supported a moratorium and said that an extension will likely be needed. Mr. Weinstein agreed that a moratorium is needed, however he strongly supported medical marijuana, and he looked forward to continued discussion.
