HUDSON'S CHARTER

- Your local "constitution," enabled by State law
- Allows a municipality to "set its own course"
- 1958 (Charter first effective approved by Village voters)
- Since 1995, amendments have occurred every five years, and in 2009.

CHARTER SECTION 13.02

- Mandatory review every 5 years
- Council appoints Commission
- Odd number of members between 7 and 11
- Serve until date of next general election
- Recommends revisions and amendments that "in its judgment seem advisable"
- Council "...shall submit same to the electors at the next general election..."

BY THE NUMBERS

- 11 meetings (January through June)
- 21 hours and 42 minutes (total meeting time)
- 2 public comment opportunities at every meeting
- 15 persons commented at meetings
- Suggestions accepted through April 30
- 71 suggestions received
- Residents, appointed officials, elected officials, CRC, and outside entities submitted suggestions
- Tracked all suggestions and CRC responses/actions

PROCESS

- Read entire charter (out loud; every section)
- Reviewed and discussed ALL suggestions
- Proposed changes
- Requested text to be drafted by Solicitor
- Reviewed, revised, finalized, and approved drafted changes

SUGGESTIONS NOT INCLUDED IN RECOMMENDATIONS

- Ranked choice voting
- Council operational/rule/policy requirements
- Additional/modified Mayoral duties
- Enhanced censure/removal requirements
- Income tax rate/credit limitation changes
- Changing Solicitor from appointed to elected

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Eight proposals (ballot issues)
- One "general administrative changes" ballot issue
- Seven ballot issues deemed worthy of being voted on separately, for reasons including but not limited to increased interest and/or potential controversy
- All but one proposal approved unanimously

BALLOT ISSUES

- **#1**: General administrative changes
- #2: Establish term limits for elected city officials
- #3: Clarify term limits for appointed members of city boards and commissions
- #4: Change the threshold to initiate a recall
- #5: Change City Council salary to meet the state's minimum retirement credit threshold
- #6: Establish the Military and Veterans' Commission
- #7: Establish the Park and Natural Resource Board
- #8: Enact expenditure accountability for tax levies benefitting other public and private entities

BALLOT ISSUE #1:

General administrative changes

Ordinance pages 1-11 | Ordinance sections 1-2
Charter preamble + sections 2.01, 3.01, 3.02, 3.08, 3.11, 4.01, 4.03, 5.02, 6.03, 6.04, 7.01, 12.01, and 12.02

- Modifies preamble
- Changes "voters" to "electors" throughout charter
- Revises elected official term commencement provisions
- Removes various requirements for newspaper notices
- Provides for appointment/removal of Acting Finance Director
- Clarifies purchasing requirements
- Designates Clerk of Council as recipient of various petitions

BALLOT ISSUE #2:

Establish term limits for elected city officials

Ordinance pages 11 and 12 | Ordinance sections 3-4 | Charter Sections 4.01 + 7.05 [NEW]

- Sets three full four-year term or 12-year (whichever is greater) limit
- Limits length of service as elected officer of the Municipality
- Enacts cumulative limit regardless of elected office
- Applies to Mayor and Council (At Large and Ward)

BALLOT ISSUE #3:

Clarify term limits for appointed members of city boards and commissions

Ordinance pages 12-17 | Ordinance sections 5-6 Charter sections 8.04, 8.06, 8.07, 9.01, 9.04, 9.06, 11.01

- Closes loopholes and removes ambiguities in current limits
- Removes "consecutive" from factoring into limit
- Sets three full four-year (two full six-year for PAAB) term or 12-year (whichever is greater) limit
- Limits length of service on each separate board and commission
- Applies to ALL (chartered) boards and commissions

BALLOT ISSUE #4:

Change the threshold to initiate a recall

Ordinance pages 17-19 | Ordinance Sections 7-8 | Charter section 12.03

- Current petition threshold requires recall petitions to be signed 25% of electors who voted in most recent gubernatorial election
- Does NOT change percentage
- Changes election used for measurement from "gubernatorial" (evennumbered year every four years) to "municipal" (odd-numbered year every two years)
- Adds reference to compliance with charter and Ohio Law

BALLOT ISSUE #5:

Change City Council salary to meet the state's minimum retirement credit threshold

Ordinance Pages 19-20 | Ordinance sections 9-10 | Charter section 3.10

- Current Council salary is currently monthly, \$80 per meeting for up to four meetings per month
- Changes Council salary to monthly, tied to minimum amount required to receive full monthly service credit
- Low/average amount based on survey of Council salaries in nearby and similar municipalities across the state

BALLOT ISSUE #6:

Establish the Military and Veterans' Commission

Ordinance pages 20-21 | Ordinance sections 11-12 | Charter section 8.09 [NEW]

- Adds current Council-created commission to charter
- Comprised of 5 or 7 members
- Includes standard qualification, compensation, vacancy, and public meeting requirements
- Includes clarified term limits per Ballot Issue #3

BALLOT ISSUE #7:

Establish the Park and Natural Resource Board

Ordinance: pages 21-26 | Ordinance sections 13-14 | Charter sections 8.04-8.08

- Combines three chartered boards/commission (Park Board, Cemetery Board, and Tree Commission)
- Lists detailed powers and duties bringing together current (overlapping) responsibilities of all three current chartered boards/commission
- Includes ALL powers and duties of current Council-created committee (Environmental Awareness Committee) in powers and duties of new board
- Comprised of odd number of members between 7 and 11, replacing 22 to 28 current members on four (three chartered and one Council-created) bodies
- Includes standard qualification, compensation, vacancy, and public meeting requirements
- Includes clarified term limits per Ballot Issue #3
- Preserves current requirement for public vote prior to sale of Municipal land devoted to public park purposes or use of public park land for other (non-park) Municipal purposes
- Makes change effective January 1, 2027 to allow one year for transition

BALLOT ISSUE #8:

Enact expenditure accountability for tax levies benefitting other public and/or private entities

Ordinance pages 26-27 | Ordinance sections 15-16 | Charter section 6.05 [NEW]

- Closes accountability/transparency loophole on expenditure side of Municipal finances
- Requires receiving entities (other public or private) to have governing bodies tied back to the electors
- Includes four options for compliance (two by direct election, one by Council appointment, and one TBD if approved by six members of Council
- Requires Council to determine compliance prior to submitting any tax levy for the ballot, regardless of the type of duration of the requested levy
