

Hudson Infrastructure is defined as the complete network of municipal assets and operating systems required to sustain our community, specifically encompassing all city rights-of-way, city easements, roadways, bridges, sidewalks, curbs, retaining walls, and trails, that form our transportation and mobility networks. It includes our vital utility and digital systems, namely our water plant, water tanks, waterlines, storm sewer networks and storm management structures, electrical substations, all electric equipment within the electrical system, light poles, signals and operating systems, signs, and broadband fiber work, along with all integrated electrical, mechanical, and computer/SCADA systems necessary to power and automate these services. Furthermore, this definition incorporates all city-owned land, buildings, structures, dams, gazebos/ pergola, the historic clocktower, as well as our public green spaces, parks, playgrounds, sport and recreation facilities, lakes, ponds, municipal golf course, cemeteries, and historical monuments that preserve our community's heritage and quality of life.
